

Art & Design

Courses in Art & Design and related areas are open to students of all levels of development unless otherwise stated.

PRACTICAL STUDIO COURSES

These are practical studio classes in the Visual Arts with emphasis on artistic skills and creative growth of the individual. Work will be carried out in the various media described. It must be stressed that in order for students to gain full benefit from studio courses they must be prepared to do work outside of class time, and should take this into consideration when enrolling for a particular course.

Unless otherwise stated, students must provide all necessary materials, which will be discussed at the first class meeting.

487. Basic Freehand Drawing. Benedict Wang, B.A. (Waterloo), B.F.A. (Manitoba), M.A. (North Dakota). Mondays, 8.00-10.00 p.m., starting February 28, 1983. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings (including one full day field trip).

Fee: \$240 including model fee

Drawing is the fundamental element in all visual arts. It is also the most intimate and spontaneous form of artistic expression. This course will study the basic elements of drawing such as line, form, tone, mass, texture etc. Students will be encouraged to experiment with different media including pencil, charcoal, conté crayon and others. There will be critiques and slide presentations to facilitate discussion of style and composition. In addition, at least one of the twelve meetings will be a Sunday field trip. Students should note that there will be homework assignments each week and plan their time accordingly.

488. Life Drawing. Malcolm Dakin, M.A. (R.C.A.) Tuesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting March 1, 1983. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$305 including model fee

The movement and structure of the human figure has been both a source of fascination and a test of the technical and creative skills of artists throughout history: from the story-telling art of the cave dwellers, through the realistic and personally expressive achievements of Michaelangelo and Raphael, to the revolutionary creative inventions of Picasso and Matisse in this century. Many aspects of working from the figure will be discussed and illustrated, and students will be encouraged to make personal and creative interpretations of the model.

Uses of line, shape, volume, and chiaroscuro are among the techniques to be covered. Beginners, as well as advanced students are welcome. The first meeting will demonstrate and discuss the different media to be used. Some homework assignments will be given, and students should plan their time accordingly.

489. Basic Watercolour Painting. Benedict Wang, B.A. (Waterloo), B.F.A. (Manitoba), M.A. (North Dakota). Tuesdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting March 1, 1983. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$225 including model fee

The basic techniques of watercolour such as wet on wet, dry on wet, dry brush and others, the preparation and use of materials, and basic colour theory will form the core of this course. The human figure, still life and landscape will be the main subjects or "take off points" for exploration of this medium. There may be one or two Sunday field trips. Students should note that previous drawing experience is a distinct advantage. Homework assignments will be given.

490. The Application of Drawing Techniques in Painting. John Rose, Dip.A.D. (Gloucester), A.T.D., Cert. Ed., (Birmingham). Thursdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting March 3, 1983. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8|F. 15 meetings.

For almost all types of painting activity, drawing is an essential accompanying and preparatory activity. Drawings usually exhibit a freshness, vitality and spontaneity that is often difficult to transmit into painting, thus one has to find equivalents for such drawing qualities. Colour contrasts, rhythmic movements of form, handling of a brush, knife, and other techniques, such as splattering, staining, dribbling, wiping and scraping, are among these. This course will mainly be concerned with 'process', that is, recording information, exploring composition, visual and technical problem solving, restating and refining imagery, leading to a major painted piece of work, in which drawing and painting are synthesised into one activity. Students' willingness to experiment and possibly give up "established habits" is essential if they are to break new ground and find new direction for their work. Homework assignments will be given, and students should plan their time accordingly. While tuition ends at 8.00 p.m., the studio will remain open till 9.30 p.m. so they may continue to work. In the event of oversubscription an interview will be held on February 24, 1983.

491. 人體素描 (Life Drawing)

主 講 人:阮曼華女士。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 10 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月二日起每星期三下午六時至八時。 學 費:三百零五元(包括模特兒費)。 (共十二講)。

本課程將以人體造形及動態作爲寫畫之題材。學員需用多種畫具包括鉛筆,

木炭條, 粉彩及鋼筆等作輪廓線描法, 動姿描法, 實感及質感描法等基本練習。課程並將應用幻燈片, 以輔助對人體畫風格和理論的探討。學員必須以課外時間做習作。

492. 中級素描 (Basic Freehand Drawing II)

丰 講 人:阮曼華女十。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 10 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月二日起每星期三下午八時至十時。

全期學費:二百四十元。 (共十二講)。

本課程專為有素描基礎者而設。內容之編排,着重不同物料和工具之實驗及 運用。學員將本其所習繪畫之知識,對構圖和色彩原理及繪畫風格等,作更深入之 研討,並探索藝術意念在平面空間之表達方点。

學員每週須付出四至六小時做習作。

如報名人數超額,將於二月二十三日舉行面, 意。

493. 基本書道 (Introduction to Chinese Calligraphy)

主 講 人:翟仕堯先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 11 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月四日起每星期五下午六時至八時。

全期學費:二百零五元。 (共十二講)。

本課程通過對中國歷代書體沿革與諸家風格之介紹,使學員了解傳統書道之 基本理法,以引起其研習書道之與趣,建立研習之基礎,並觸發對現代書道之探 索。

課程將著重於書寫之實習。除堂課練習外,學員必須以課外時間做習作。

494. 中級書道 (Intermediate Chinese Calligraphy)

主 講 人:翟仕堯先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程市區中心 11 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月四日起每星期五下午八時至十時。

全期學費:二百零五元。 (共十二講)。

旨在輔導學員本其固有之書道知識與技巧,對傳統書體作更深研習;藉以觸 發個人風格之探索。

課程內容之編排,適合稍有書道基礎者深造與發展。本其所習,更對幅式空間之設計;五色墨彩之變化與筆鋒運旋之韻律等藝術問題,旣作更深入之研討,同時亦出以新的探索。

除堂課練習外,學員必須以課外時間做習作及閱讀參考書籍。

495. 山水重入手新試 (Varieties of Chinese Landscape Painting)

主 講 人:徐子雄先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 11 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月一日起每星期二下午六時至八時。

學 費:全期二百零五元。 (共十二講)。

本課程旨爲有國畫基礎者而設。內容將著重研習山水畫的多種技法及入手方

法,並對中西處理風景題材的異同處作比較。課程並輔予幻燈片研討及專題示範。 除課堂練習外,學員必須以課外時間做習作。

如報名人數超額,將於一九八三年二月二十日舉行面試。

496. 初級攝影 (Introduction to Photography)

主 講 人:吳漢霖先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 13 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月二日起每星期三下午七時至九時三十分。

學 費:全期三百五十元。 (共十二講)。

本課程著重啟發學員對攝影藝術的理解及觀賞照片的基本能力。課程將研習一般照相機的運用,採光原理及黑房冲晒技術等,並簡介攝影史與近代重要攝影家的作品,學員必須以課外時間做習作。

497. A Guide to Better Photography. Wong Wo-bik, B.F.A. (Columbus College, Ohio), M.F.A. (Temple Univ.). Thursdays, 6.00-7.00 p.m., starting March 3, or April 14, 1983. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 6 meetings.

Fee: \$75

Not everyone who takes photographs aspires to be a "photographer", but even the amateur would like to take better pictures. This course will discuss the basic types of cameras, lens, films and other accessories for basic picture taking. Composition, focussing, lighting and camera operation will be introduced in these illustrated lectures. If time permits developing and printing of black and white photography will be introduced.

498. Intermediate Black and White Photography. Ng Hon-lam, M.A. (Manchester Polytechnic). Fridays, 7.00-9.30 p.m., starting March 4, 1983. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8 F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$350

Black and White photography remains an exciting and creative means of expression partly because of the degree of manipulation and control one can have of the media. Through the exploration of a variety of techniques and

materials students will develop a greater means of individual expression in black and white photography. In addition to personal work, students will be given assigned projects to help broaden their experience. Among the specialities to be explored are: infra-red, micro-photography, photograms (cameraless images), the special effects achieved through varieties of film and paper, uses of lighting, and others. This course is aimed at students with previous experience in basic camera and darkroom procedures for black and white photography. In the event of oversubscription an interview will be held on Friday, February 25, 1983.

499. Introduction to Photography. Wong Wo-bik, B.F.A. (Columbus College, Ohio), M.F.A. (Temple Univ.). Thursdays, 7.15-9.45 p.m., starting March 3, 1983. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$250

Aimed at those with a serious interest in Photography as a vehicle for expression and communication, this course will cover the basic studio and darkroom techniques of black and white and colour photography as well as choices of equipment and materials. In addition, theories of photography, both aesthetic and philosophic, will be explored. Students will be expected to experiment in the media, and class critiques will be held on the results of these. Students must provide their own cameras. Basic darkroom materials and supplies to be used during class sessions will be provided.

500. Introduction to Colour Photography. Wong Wo-bik, B.F.A. (Columbus College, Ohio), M.F.A. (Temple University). Tuesdays, 7.00–9.30 p.m., starting March 1, 1983. Room 13, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. I full day field trip. Fee: \$360

Aimed at those with a basic knowledge of photography, including use of cameras and darkroom procedure, this course will introduce students to the technical and aesthetic aspects of colour photography. Working with both slides and colour negative film, students will learn how to best use and control various lighting situations for their own purposes, to effectively select subject matter, and to use colour to the best advantage. Emphasis will also be placed on the technical aspects of making colour prints from both slides and negatives. Hand colouring and retouching methods will be introduced, and there will be a brief look at the history of colour photography. Assignments will be given, and class critiques will be held on the results of these. There will be one field trip on a Sunday. Paper and chemicals for use during class time will be provided and the cost of these is included in the course fee. Enrolment is limited to 15 students, and in the event of oversubscription an interview will be held on February 21, 1983.

APPLIED DESIGN

501. Introduction to Interior Design. Tutor to be announced. Wednesdays, 8.00–10.00 p.m., starting March 2, 1983. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$205

As an introduction to the discipline of interior design, this course will cover the basic analysis, conceptualisation, and communication of ideas through drawing, colour, materials and finishes as explored through a series of small domestic and commercial projects. There will be a minimum of five hours of homework each week. In the event of oversubscription an interview will take place on February 23, 1983.

502. Introduction to Graphic Design. Derick Pao, B.A. (Purdue). Tuesdays, 8.00-10.00 p.m., starting March 1, 1983. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$205

Aimed at those who are considering graphic design as a career, this studio course will provide the student with a broad view of the role, function and practice of the graphic designer, enabling the student to make an informed and intelligent career choice. Among the topics to be covered will be, categories and application of graphic design and its relationship to society, structure of a graphic design agency, the education syllabus for graphic design, and the future of graphic design as a career.

503. Presentation Drawing for Commercial Art. Patrick Fong, B.F.A. (Columbus College). Mondays, 8.00-10.00 p.m., starting February 28, 1983. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$205

Aimed at those with some experience in interior or product design, the basic drawing techniques and visual "symbols" used to describe a variety of materials and surfaces will be introduced. Through a series of drawing exercise in various media, including pencil, graphite stick, ballpoint, felt-pen, colour markers and others, students will explore and understand the form construction of different objects, the characteristics of different materials and surfaces, and will build their vocabulary of descriptive techniques which will then be put to use in a series of more complex drawings such as interiors, architecture, automobiles, and others which require combined techniques. Students should note that there will be a minimum of four hours of homework each week, and plan their time accordingly.

504. Illustration for Graphic Design. Patrick Lo, B.A. (Middlesex), M.A. (R.C.A.). Wednesdays, 6.00-8.00 p.m., starting March 2, 1983. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$205

There are a great variety of techniques and approaches that can be used in

illustration for graphic design. In theory it is unlimited: in reality limits are set by costs, printing processes, client specifications, etc. This studio course, while emphasising the media and technique of illustration, will also include information on layout, printing methods, and the client-illustrator relationship. Students will be expected to do homework each week and should plan their time accordingly. Previous drawing experience is essential. In the event of oversubscription an interview will be required on February 23, 1983.

505. Information Graphics. Patrick Lo, B.A. (Middlesex), M.A. (R.C.A.). Thursdays, 6.00–8.00 p.m., starting March 3, 1983. Room 11, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$205

This is a relatively new area in the field of graphic design, emphasizing the effectiveness and functional role of graphics through research and analysis. Topics included in the course are: systems and research methods, bar charts, diagrams, wall charts, sign systems, information-illustration, colour perception, and human psychology. Assignments will be given each week and students should plan their time accordingly.

506. 商業美術設計 (Commercial Art & Design)

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 14 室。

時 間:一九八三年二月廿八日起每星期一下午八時十五分至九時四十五分。

全期學費:二百零五元。 (共十二講)。

第六章握一定的意念構思能力及平面表達技巧。

" 課程內容包括:器材及物料運用,平面設計及色彩原理,字體設計,插圖技巧,正稿製作及印刷常識等。並輔予幻燈片作研討,及實地參觀實用設計之製作過程。學員必須以課外時間做習作。

507. 喷畫技術及運用 (Air Brush Painting)

主 講 人:馬耀平先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 11 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月三日起每星期四下午八時至十時。

全期學費:一百七十五元。 (共十講)。

近年來噴筆技術在藝術及商業設計之領域中帶有刺激性影響。適當之技術運 用及配以其他物料,則可製造獨特之效果。

導師將從其豐富之商業插圖經驗入手,使學員實習各種噴筆技巧,以發揮其

他美術創作。課程並輔予幻燈片研討及專題示範,同時提供簡單及廉宜之<u>噴畫工具</u> 設置方法,務使學員可在居所內自行創作。

學員須具繪畫經驗並購置約二百元之**噴**筆及其他物料。如報名人數超額,將 於二月廿四日舉行面試。

508. Life Drawing Workshop. Eva Yuen, B.F.A. (Columbus College), M.A. (Case Western Reserve), Co-ordinator. Fridays, 10.00 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting March 4, 1983. Room 10, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$240

Those interested in drawing from the human figure know that one can never get too much practice. For that reason we are offering this series of life drawing practice sessions aimed at those already engaged in the study of life drawing. Though no formal tuition, as such, will be given, a member of the Art and Design teaching staff will be present to plan and organize model poses and to give informal comments and critiques as requested or required. Applicants must have previous experience in life drawing or freehand drawing, and be able to plan their own drawings, choose materials, etc. In the event of oversubscription an interview will be required.

509. Introduction to Fabric Printing. Marion Hughes, D.A. (Dundee College of Art), Cert.Ed. (Glasgow). Thursdays, 10.00 a.m.—12.00 noon, starting March 3, 1983. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$290

All the main ways of printing patterns on to textiles as a traditional craft form will be introduced. Methods of block printing, silkscreen, batik and tie-dye will be explained and demonstrated so that students will be able to produce printed fabric at home. Equipment used is easily obtainable and in some cases can be made by the student. As well as printing specific articles, it is hoped that students will also produce lengths of printed fabric. In addition, the basic principles of design and drawing as they relate to textile design will be discussed. Students will be expected to provide most of their own materials. Inks and dyes will be provided for class use, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

510. Intermediate Batik. Marion Hughes, D.A. (Dundee College of Art,) Cert. Ed. (Glasgow). Tuesdays, 10.00 a.m.-12.00 noon, starting March 1, 1983. Pokfulam Studio, 144 Pokfulam Road. 12 meetings. Fee: \$290

Aimed at those already familiar with the basic techniques and principles of batik, this course will explore the "Indonesian" method of batik which enables greater precision and intricacy of design and colour than "Western" batik. Students will use the tjan-ting, paint brush, and tjap, and will experiment with a variety of waxes and dyes. In order to get full benefit from the course students

should allow time at home for the planning of their designs. Students will be expected to provide most of their own materials. Inks, dyes and other sundries for use during class time will be provided, and the cost of these is included in the course fee.

511. Introduction to Ukiyo-e. Joan Hall Scott, M.A. (Univ. of Penna.). Tuesdays, 10.00-11.30 a.m., starting March 1, 1983. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$120

In the hands of the Japanese the medium of the woodblock print was raised to a higher technical and aesthetic level than anywhere else in the world. In this series of introductory lectures these prints will be seen in the social and historical context of 17th-19th Century Japan. The technical evolution of the art form and its aesthetic conventions will be discussed, and the major schools and artists analysed. Also included in this illustrated course will be practical pointers about collecting, authenticating, and conserving prints.

ART APPRECIATION

512. Great Masters of Impressionism and Post-Impressionism. Kathryn Moore Heleniak, B.A. (Michigan), Ph.D. (N.Y.U.) Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting March 1, 1983. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$120

Beginning with an analysis of the radical innovations of Impressionism as in the luminous canvases of Manet, Monet and Renoir, and in the psychologically complex paintings of Degas, the lectures will thereafter focus upon the reaction to Impressionism in the 1880s by the Impressionists themselves, and by the Post-Impressionists following in their wake: Cezanne, Seurat, Van Gogh, Gauguin, Munch and others will be included in this section. We will observe how the artists' attention shifts from an interest in depicting the visible world, in all its fleeting and ephemeral moments, to a new concentration upon states of mind and universal feelings expressed in highly "unnatural" forms and colours in an effort to create what Cezanne described as "something solid and durable like the art of museums".

513. Mainstreams of Modern Art. Kathryn Moore Heleniak, B.A. (Michigan), Ph.D. (N.Y.U.). Wednesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting March 2, 1983. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$120

"Modern Art" was, or is, considered to be "radical", or at least controversial. Coming from, and reacting to traditional Western art it continues to interact with our values and perception, and to affect our lives. The major trends and artists in twentieth century art will be examined, including Expressionism, Cubism, Dada, Surrealism, Abstract Expressionism, Pop Art, Minimalism and some of the newer trends.

514. Understanding Ukiyo-e. Henry Steiner, M.F.A. (Yale). Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 28, 1983. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 6 meetings. Fee: \$80

The two hundred year history of Japanese woodblock prints represents one of man's most satisfying visual achievements. This short course provides an introduction to this vital art form, dealing with the historic and technical background and investigating the main themes, including actors, women, landscape, and erotic subjects.

The teacher is both a graphic designer and print collector. Numerous colour transparencies will accompany the lectures.

515. Chinese Art and Artifacts. Deborah Fairman, B.A. (Hamilton Univ.), M.S. (Hunter College, C.U.N.Y.). Mondays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting April 1, 1983. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 6 meetings.

Fee: \$80

This course is designed to answer common queries about the symbolism of Chinese Art motifs and the function of various esoteric Chinese objects. The main focus of the course will be on Chinese art and artifacts still available in Hong Kong. Stress will be placed on art motifs and symbolism as exemplified in the porcelain of the Ming and Ching periods, especially underglaze cobalt blue wares, Chinese and Mongol silver jewellery and ornaments, decorative arts of the Ming and Ching periods, textiles and interesting objects such as incense clocks, handwarmers, objects associated with cricket keeping and fighting, basketry, opium paraphernalia and other articles.

Courses Nos. 516 to 527 are designed to be of assistance to those preparing for the examinations of the Association of Certified Accountants, the Hong Kong Society of Accountants, the Institute of Cost and Management Accountants and the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators. The courses are a complement to, not a substitute for, correspondence courses. Students should make their own arrangements for sitting the relevant examinations.

516. An Introduction to Accounting, Part 2. Jennifer Fung, B.Sc., M.B.A., C.P.A., A.I.B. Wednesdays, 7.15–9.15 p.m., starting February 23, 1983. Room 121, University Main Building. 14 meetings. Fee: \$220

Part 2 covers the preparation and presentation of final accounts for sole trader and partnership, introduction to the accounts of limited companies, and interpretation of accounting statements. Taken together with Part 1, offered during the autumn, students will have covered the syllabus of the ACCA/HKSA first level accounting course. The course is also suitable for students studying other professional examinations at the foundation level. New students who have done some previous study at this level may join Part 2.

517. Foundation Accounting 2. Norman W. Y. Ngai, B.A. (Sheff), A.C.M.A., A.H.K.S.A., M.B.I.M. Fridays, 7.15-9.15 p.m., starting March 11, 1983. Room 121, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$180

This is the second part of the Foundation Course begun last autumn with the same tutor. In this part there will be an introduction to the financial framework of limited companies and coverage of shares and loan capital; preparation of simple final accounts for limited companies; departmental accounts; interpretation of financial statements; simple ratio analysis and funds flow statements. Students who have made a start on studying the ACCA Level 1 syllabus may join this course.

518. Intermediate Accounting. Chan Sai-man, Gabriel, A.C.I.S., A.C.M.A., A.H.K.S.A., M.B.I.M. Mondays, 6.30-8.30 p.m., starting February 21, 1983. Room 121, University Main Building. 15 meetings. Fee: \$240

Topics selected for discussion will be: partnership accounts with emphasis on change of partners, dissolution and conversion to limited companies, and accounts of limited companies, including issue and redemption of shares and debentures, final accounts for publication, principles of consolidation, interpretation of accounts and flow of funds statement.

The two courses below relate to the new A.C.C.A. examination for subject 2.9 Advanced Accounting Practice-double paper. Each class will be conducted at the same level but will emphasize different aspects of the syllabus.

519. Advanced Accounting Practice A. To Pak-lam, A.C.C.A., A.H.K.S.A. Thursdays, 7.15-9.15 p.m., starting February 24, 1983. Room 121, University Main Building. 16 meetings. Fee: \$260

This course will particularly look at section A of the syllabus, accounts of limited companies, S.S.A.P.'s, current cost accounting, deferred taxation, earnings per share, accounting for mergers, acquisitions and reconstructions, some aspects of section E, the analysis of financial statements and some topics from section C on the conversion of a partnership to a limited company and piecemeal realisation of a partnership.

520. Advanced Accounting Practice B. Alan Wong, M.A. Fridays, 6.30-8.30 p.m., starting February 25, 1983. Room 103, University Main Building. 16 meetings. Fee: \$260

This course will select topics from section B of the syllabus, the accounts of groups of companies covering acquisition method and merger method, the consolidated balance sheet and profit and loss account, disclosure requirements and associated companies, cover section E on analysis of financial statements and discuss S.S.A.P.'s.

521. Auditing. Andy S. C. Lee, B.B.A., A.C.C.A. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 15 meetings. Fee: \$180

Following the ACCA syllabus, topics to be discussed and studied are: audit procedures and internal control, the validity of principles in public reporting, types of investigations, forms of audit report, the effectiveness of legislation in protecting interested parties, case law affecting auditors, the effect of computers on audit practice, the special audit, planning, controlling and recording of an audit, current developments in the practice of auditing, and auditing standards and guidelines.

522. Costing. John Ellis, F.I.I.A., F.H.K.S.A., A.A.S.A., A.A.I.M., A.C.I.S., M.I.T.O. Mondays, 6.15-8.15 p.m., starting February 21, 1983. Room 103, University Main Building. 14 meetings. Fee: \$220

The main areas of study will be: costing for materials, labour and overheads, job costing and process costing, breakeven analysis, profit volume ratio, marginal costing, introduction to standard costing, and variance analysis. The course will be particularly useful to students taking the A.C.C.A./A.C.M.A. Costing I examination. Please note all students on this course must have at least one year of accounting experience.

523. Advanced Costing: a managerial approach. Choi Kwok-lam, A.C.M.A., A.H.K.S.A., Dip.M.S. (Derby). Thursdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 24, 1983. Room 103, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

Following on from the costing theory and practice course of last term this course will proceed with a management accounting emphasis. It is designed to introduce management accounting techniques, especially budgetary control, marginal costing and contribution concepts and investment analysis techniques. Applicants should have a good knowledge of basic costing. The course will be suitable for those taking the first costing paper of professional examinations.

524. Numerical Analysis for Accountants. K. G. Jones, B.Com. (Melbourne), F.C.C.A., F.H.K.S.A., F.A.S.A., F.C.I.S., Principal Lecturer, Hong Kong Polytechnic. Saturdays, 3.45-6.00 p.m., starting February 26, 1983. Room 21, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$180

The aim of this course is to give students an understanding of numerical relationships and how to interpret them as an aid in business planning and control. The course will follow the A.C.C.A./H.K.S.A. syllabus and topics to be studied include: calculus with profit maximisation, matrix algebra, compound interest, present value analysis, discounting, accumulating, amortisation, annuities, the nature of statistics, sources of data, presentation of data and time series with regression and correlation.

525. Quantitative Analysis for Accountants. S. Chibber, B.Sc., M.Sc. (O.R.), Post-Grad. Dip. in B.M., F.B.I.M., M.I.I.M. Tuesdays, 6.15-8.15 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room LG2, Hui Oi Chow Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 20 meetings. Fee: \$300

The objective of this course is to provide students and practitioners with a basic understanding of quantitative techniques and their applications in the management of business. The A.C.C.A. syllabus will be followed and topics to be discussed in detail are: statistical concepts—probability and sampling distributions, regression analysis; operational research—linear programming, inventory control, network analysis queueing theory and simulation.

526. An Introduction to Hong Kong Taxation. Tam Tak-ding, A.C.C.A., A.H.K.S.A., A.C.I.S. Fridays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 25, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

The subject will be discussed under five main headings: salaries tax assessment, profits tax assessment, personal assessment including assessment on partnerships, objections to assessments and provisional tax.

527. Company Secretaryship. J. A. Ellis, E.D., F.I.I.A., F.H.K.S.A., A.A.S.A., A.A.I.M., A.C.I.S., M.I.T.O. Tuesdays, 7.15-9.15 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room 121, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$190

The practical aspects of the Company Secretary's job will be described with special reference to the procedures and administration of companies registered under the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. This course is suitable for students who wish to acquire a basic knowledge of Secretarial Practice for practical use as well as for students taking professional examinations.

528. Elementary Book-keeping and Accounts. Chan Kee-ming, A.C.I.S. Wednesdays, 6.15-8.30 p.m., starting February 23, 1983. Room 103, University Main Building. 15 meetings. Fee: \$250

This course will cover the principles of elementary book-keeping; the theory of double entry system; the keeping of books of original entry such as: sales book, returns inwards/outwards books, cash book and petty cash; bank account, bank reconciliation statement; cheques and bank drafts; the ledger, debtors and creditors account; the trial balance; the final account and the balance sheet; the journal and the adjustment.

The course is particularly suitable for those who are not intending to become professional accountants but who need to be able to understand accounting principles and methods and to operate a set of financial books of records.

529. Financial Accounting: Assets. Patricia Wai, B.A. (Simon Fraser). Thursdays, 7.45–8.45 p.m., starting February 24, 1983. Room 30, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$110

The course will take an indepth look at the assets side of the balance sheet. There will be detailed discussion of current assets, including cash and temporary investments, receivables, inventories and prepaid expenses, fixed assets, long term investments, plant assets, depreciation and depletion and intangible assets. Alternative valuation bases will be emphasized and illustrated. The course is suitable for those intending a professional accounting career as well as those requiring more and advanced practical knowledge.

530. Practical Auditing. K. H. Chow, B.Soc.Sc., C.I.S.A., A.H.K.S.A., A.C.I.S. Mondays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting February 28, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 15 meetings. Fee: \$180

This course is designed for those who already have practical experience in the field and who wish to update and refine their auditing techniques. Topics to be studied will include internal control, audit guidelines, audit of profit and loss items and balance sheet areas, computer auditing and selected SSAP's.

Financial Management for the Businessman. Joseph Li, B.B.A. i.S.). Saturdays, 2.00–3.30 p.m., starting February 26, 1983. Room 121, persity Main Building. 14 meetings. Fee: \$170

his introductory course in financial management is for those who have not ied the subject before but who wish to have a general coverage in this area order to improve their financial management knowledge. Topics to be ussed: working capital management, business finance, capital structure and cost of capital and forms of financial information. The course will take a tical approach; case studies will be used, and students should be prepared articipate in class discussions.

Food and Beverage Cost Control and Profit Improvement. Paul ing, B.Sc., M.Sc., M.B.A., A.H.C.I.M.A. Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting ruary 24, 1983. Room LG2, Hui Oi Chow Science Building, University of 18 Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$160

'ood and beverage cost control and profit improvement is a sophisticated nagement tool used in modern hotel and catering operations enabling nagement to control and monitor food and beverage cost and improve profit hout sacrificing quality.

I'he aim of this course is to familiarize participants with the basic principles well as the practical applications of these principles and concepts. Cases will used and topics to be discussed include food and beverage costing and cost itrol concepts and methods, purchasing and receiving control, menu control, h register control, bar operation control and corruption prevention methods. I'he course will be conducted in a lecture/discussion/demonstration format l participants must have some basic knowledge of Food and Beverage operation accounting procedures.

3. Financing and Management of Corporate Assets. Chung Kai-chiu, B.A. (Illinois). Tuesdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room 20, tra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 15 meetings. Fee: \$180

The objectives of this course are to provide the concepts and techniques of ancial management related to corporate cash management, control of accounts reivables and trade credit management, principles of inventory management, out and intermediate term financing. Special topics such as financial evaluation a potential acquisition, financial analysis and projections will also be covered. This course is designed for junior and middle executives who already have a sic knowledge of financial management and/or elementary accounting and seek broaden their knowledge in this area.

534. Understanding Company Financial Statements. Mak Kam-kie, B.Sc., M.B.A., M.B.I.M. Saturdays, 2.00-3.30 p.m., starting February 26, 1983. Room 21, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

This course is designed for those who have no knowledge of this subject but wish to acquire a general idea in interpreting financial statements and understanding basic financial management. Topics to be covered: basic financial statements, financial ratios, use of financial ratios in credit analysis, financial ratios in different industries, limitation of ratio analysis, financial structure, investment appraisal, cost of capital and sources of funds.

535. Computers in Business Management: Decision-Making. Bernard Tsui, B.Sc. (Leeds). Tuesdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room 103, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$145

In the progressive business world of Hong Kong the use of computers is becoming commonplace. It is essential for all businessmen to understand the capacity of computers and to appreciate the techniques for using computers in business. Emphasis will be placed on decision-making with a computer. The course is most suitable for those who have some knowledge of computers and mathematics.

536. Computer Auditing: a basic appreciation. George Leung, A.C.I.S. Tuesdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting March 1, 1983. Room 103, University Main Building. 11 meetings. Fee: \$130

The technique of computer auditing is developing rapidly. This course will briefly consider the fundamental concepts of EDP and the principles of auditing, then review computer auditing practice in general, by looking at the various controls in a computer environment and their use in auditing, and will follow on with a deeper analysis of the audit of a computer application using appropriate case studies. Although the course is at an introductory level it will be assumed that all applicants already have a basic knowledge of auditing.

537. Management Auditing. Richard H. K. Kong, A.I.B., M.B.I.M., A.M.I.T.D., M.Inst.A.M. Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 26, 1983. Room 17, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$120

Management auditing is the systematic examination of the policies and practices within an organisation to assess their effectiveness. It has become the term for the audit of activities other than those pertaining to financial statement examination. The course is designed to provide understanding of the scope and nature of management auditing as well as how to conduct a management auditing assignment.

538. Corporate Planning and Control. K. C. Ko, M.C.I.T., A.C.I.S., M.Inst.Pkg., M.B.I.M. Fridays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 25, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

The practice of Corporate Planning and Control has grown rapidly in recent years as a means for guiding future development of both public and private enterprises. This is an introductory course designed to give an idea and understanding of the concept of Corporate Planning and Control and its role in the successful running of a business. Systematic approaches to preparing business plans will be explained in simple and straightforward language as will the application of relevant management, accounting and quantitative analysis techniques. The course is so designed that no previous knowledge of accounting or operational research is required.

Topics to be covered will include: moving averages, bar charts, momentum, index analysis, volume analysis, and point and figure analysis. Lectures will include a review of technical analysis and the types of analysis used. In addition there will be as a workshop where students will learn to use technical analysis through actual construction and analysis of charts.

544. Principles of Economics: Microeconomics. K. K. Cheung, B.A., M.A. (Econ.) (Carleton). Fridays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting February 25, 1983. Room 28, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

This course aims at introducing the basic analytical tools of economics to interested students. Topics to be discussed will include: the theory of value, prices and costs, factor pricing, competition and monopoly, and the theory of the firm, etc. Good mathematics is not required but ability to interpret graphical presentation is essential.

545. Principles of Economics: Macroeconomics. Ho To-ming, B.A., M.Sc. (Econ.) (London). Tuesdays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting March 1, 1983. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$120

This course introduces the principles of macro-economics and their practical applications to current economic problems concerning the Hong Kong economy. Topics covered include: national income analysis, consumption, investment, public finance, employment, money and banking, inflation and deflation, international trade, economic growth and development. The interdependence of all sectors of the economy will be discussed. Good mathematics is not required but ability to interpret simple graphical presentation is essential.

546. Introduction to Money and Banking. Lee Chi-sum, M.A. (Econ.) (York), M.B.A., F.I.C.B. Wednesdays, 6.45–8.15 p.m., starting February 23, 1983. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$160

The course will focus on the nature and implication of monetary phenomena in the economy. Topics to be discussed will include: the financial system of Hong Kong, the demand for and supply of money, monetary vs. fiscal policy, the foreign exchange market, the international monetary system and the gold market, etc. Applicants should have a knowledge of economics equivalent to principles of Economics I level.

547. Basic Methods of Economic Forecasting. Lee Chi-sum, M.A. (Econ.) (York), M.B.A., F.I.C.B. Mondays, 6.45-8.15 p.m., starting February 21, 1983. Room 122, University Main Building. 14 meetings. Fee: \$150

The primary objective is to provide an elementary but comprehensive introduction to the science of using statistical methods for economic forecasting. Topics discussed will include the nature of regression analysis, two variable regression analysis, multiple regression, simultaneous equation models, auto-regressive and the use of dummy variables. Students are expected to have prior knowledge of statistics and economics.

548. Monetary Economics. Conrad Chang, B.Soc.Sc. (Econ.) (H.K.), A.I.B., A.C.I.S., C.Dip.A.F. Saturdays, 2.30-4.30 p.m., starting February 26, 1983. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 15 meetings. Fee: \$200

This course is designed for those who will be taking the Stage 2 Monetary Economics paper of the Institute of Bankers. Topics to be discussed will include: the concept of money, the U.K. financial system, interest rates, overview of monetary theory, monetary policy and control, balance of payments, exchange rates/markets, international financial system and Eurocurrency markets.

549. The Hong Kong Economy. Lau Ping-kwan, B.Comm., M.A. (Econ.) (Alberta). Fridays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 25, 1983. Room G3, James Hsioung Lee Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

This course is designed to provide students with an overview of the Hongkong economy with emphasis on its features and up-dated statistics. Topics to be discussed will include: the political framework, manufacturing and service industries, external trade, financial system, the real estate market, labour and wages, prices and inflation, the Government policy on public expenditure, housing, population and infrastructure as well as economic relationships between Hong Kong and China.

550. Elements of Banking. Conrad Chang, B.Soc.Sc. (Econ.), (H.K.), A.I.B., A.C.I.S., C.Dip.A.F. Thursdays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting February 24, 1983. Room LG2, Hui Oi Chow Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings.

Fee: \$180

The objective is to provide banking students with basic knowledge of the monetary and financial system: the place of banks in the national economy and the framework within which they operate. Topics covered will include money, evolution of banking, British banking system, central and commercial banks, the Hong Kong banking industry and bank services. This course is designed for those who will be taking the Elements of Banking paper of the Institute of Bankers.

551. Practice of Banking I. C. S. Chan, A.I.B. Thursdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 24, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 15 meetings. Fee: \$200

The objective of the course is to provide students with basic banking knowledge. Topics to be discussed will include: relationship of banker and customer, banking operations and services, types of account-holder, securities for advances and advances to customers. This course may be suitable for students who are preparing themselves for professional examinations in banking.

552. Practice of Banking II. David Ho, A.I.B. Mondays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting February 28, 1983. Room 101, James Hsioung Lee Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$180

This course is designed for those who will be taking Paper 2 of Practice of Banking of the Institute of Bankers. Topics will include financial statement analysis, financial forecasting, credit evaluation and structure, pricing and profitability, factoring, import/export finance, marketing.

553. Finance of Foreign Trade. W. K. Poon, A.C.I.S., A.I.B., M.B.I.M. Mondays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 21, 1983. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 15 meetings. Fee: \$200

The tutor will select topics from the AIB syllabus for Finance of International Trade and Foreign Exchange. Topics include: foreign exchange market, rate of exchange, spot and forward rates, swaps and arbitrage, funds management, methods of making international payments, collection of clean and documentary bills, documentary letters of credit.

554. Law Relating to Banking. W. K. Poon, A.C.I.S., A.I.B., M.B.I.M. Mondays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 21, 1983. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 15 meetings. Fee: \$200

The objective of the course is to provide students with knowledge of the elements of law which are relevant to banking practice. It is intended for those who are working in a bank or are closely associated with banking in their daily business. Topics to be discussed include relationship between banker and customer; types of accounts; partnership and company law; negotiable instruments with particular reference to drawing, issue, negotiation, collection and payment of cheques.

555. O. & M. Relating to Banking. Conrad Chang, B.Soc.Sc. (Econ.) (H.K.), A.I.B., A.C.I.S., C.Dip.A.F. Fridays, 8.00-9.30 p.m., starting February 25, 1983. Room G3, James Hsioung Lee Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 14 meetings. Fee: \$180

The objective of the course is to provide participants with basic knowledge of O & M techniques in relation to bank operations. Topics will include: work study in the bank, introduction to method study and work measurement, forms design and control, charting techniques, office layout and working environment, office machines, procedure manual and report writing. This course may be suitable for banking students and those who have recently joined the bank's management services department.

556. Case Problems in Finance. Kenneth C. S. Kwan, M.B.A. (Hawaii). Thursdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 24, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 15 meetings. Fee: \$180

Applications of financial principles and analytical techniques to financial problems and developments. The cases illustrate such topics as international banking, foreign exchange risks, long-run investment and financing, working capital management, and financial control and taxation. The course is designed for credit/financial analysts or those who have taken the Extra-Mural course, "International Banking" or its equivalent. Students should note that there will be a minimum of three hours of homework each week, and plan their time accordingly.

Recommended texts:

Case Problems in Finance by J. Keith Butters and others, Eighth Edition (Irwin, 1981).

International Finance: Cases and Simulation by Robert S. Carlson and others. (Addison Wesley, 1980).

557. Elements of Statistical Theory I. Mok Mo-ching, B.Sc. (Maths.), M.Sc. (Stat.) (Glasgow). Saturdays, 2.15-3.45 p.m., starting February 26, 1983. Room 228, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$140

The basic concepts of statistical theory will be introduced for those who wish to acquire some knowledge of elementary statistics and for candidates studying for professional examinations requiring a statistics paper. Topics to be covered include: presentation of data; frequency distributions; introductory probability and elementary probability distributions; sample and population; statistical inference.

558. Finite Sampling. Iris Yeung, M.Sc. (Stat.) (London). Saturdays, 2.30-4.30 p.m., starting February 26, 1983. Room 230, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$170

The objective of this course is to provide students with a fundamental knowledge of the basic concepts and techniques of sampling theory in order to infer the population characteristics from the selected sample. Topics include: simple random sampling, ratio estimator, regression estimator, stratified sampling, cluster sampling, systematic sampling, multistage sampling, replicated sampling.

559. 銀行實務概論 (二) (Principles of Banking Practice II)

Management Studies

560. An Introduction to Business Management. Auyeung Ying-fai, B.A. (Whitworth Coll.), M.B.A. (Portland State). Wednesdays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting February 23, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings.

Managing a modern business enterprise is an activity for which relatively few of those who become involved in it have had proper training. The functions of the managerial process will be examined, together with the design of structures necessary to accomplish organizational objectives, as well as the development of managerial thought in its historical context. Particular attention will be paid to an analysis of the three major functional disciplines—Manufacture, Finance and Marketing—and case studies will also be reviewed. This course has been specially designed for junior executives or those about to enter the management field, who wish to broaden their knowledge of modern management techniques.

561. Management Principles and Policy. Benjamin Fung, B.Comm. (Concordia), Dip. Management (McGill), A.C.I.S. Tuesdays, 7.15-8.45 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room G3, James Hsioung Lee Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The objective of the course is to introduce participants to an understanding of the wider responsibilities of management as a preparation for the holding of senior management posts. Topics to be discussed comprise the definitions of management; the identification of management functions and responsibilities; the formulation and execution of policy; the setting of objectives; the exercise of delegation, authority and responsibility; structure and theories of organization; the establishment of appropriate forms of organization; the roles of senior and junior management and differences between them; direction and motivation; training and development; continuity of management succession; problems of large organizations, the social responsibilities of management.

562. Managing Systems and Organizational Behaviour. Pinkie Ng, M.Sc. (Heriot-Watt), D.M.S. Thursdays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 24, 1983. Room 103, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The management of an enterprise requires a balance to be struck between impersonal systems and the human requirements which have to be met in any organization. The history and development of ideas in these two areas will be the subject of this course. There will be a progressive analysis of the history of

management theory, including the setting of objectives, policy-making, systems and procedures, requirements for planning and organizing and adjustment to change. The meaning of behavioural science will also be examined and illustrated from the fields of organizational psychology and sociology. This course will be of interest to those in general management and to personnel specialists who wish to broaden their knowledge of the way these two aspects of management have developed and interact.

563. Organization and Methods. Samuel San, B.E. (N.S.W.). Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 19, 1983. Room 22, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The techniques of a sound Organization and Methods approach to the running of a business enterprise are being adopted by an increasing number of companies in the modern world. Designed for office line and general managers, this course will cover the application of O. & M. techniques from basic fact finding, the analysis of bad procedures through to specialized techniques of an advanced nature. Specifically, the speaker will examine the problems of forms layout and design, the selection and usage of office machines, clerical aids, together with the supporting role of statistical techniques and of critical path analysis. Examples will be used to show the successful application of O. & M. techniques, taking into account the human implications of changes made.

564. Manufacturing Planning and Control. Alfred Chan Tit-yu, B.Sc. (New York State), M.Sc. (Georgia I.T.). Tuesdays, 7.45–9.15 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room 30, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings.

Planning and control problems in manufacturing industry present managers with some of the most complex and important areas of decision-making. This course is designed for junior and middle managers in the production field who face such problems. Planning and reporting techniques will be analyzed together with the relation between production and other functional areas of manufacture. Specific attention will be paid to demand forecasting, design and industrial engineering, the planning of production and materials flow, operations scheduling, and reporting control on the shop floor.

565. Decision-making: A Systems Approach. Patrick Leung, B.Sc., M.A., M.S.W. (Ohio State). Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 19, 1983. Room 30, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

Decision-making is recognized as a major process in management at any level in an organization. The object of this course is to provide managers and administrators, as well as those who are about to enter the field in the public or private sector, with a systematic approach to making decisions within an organizational context. Certain fundamental questions will be addressed: what should be achieved in an organization; how should it be accomplished; what resources should be allocated for the task; what methods should be utilized to evaluate the effectiveness and efficiency of the organization? Although some quantitative techniques will be examined in this course, only a basic knowledge of algebra and arithmetic will be required.

566. Decision Analysis in Engineering Management. Tong King-kwong, B.Sc. (West Virginia I.T.), M.Sc. (Tennessee). Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 19, 1983. Room 14, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

This course is designed for Managers and Supervisors who are required to take decisions on a quantitative basis about various alternatives for the selection or replacement of industrial equipment. The subjects to be covered include interest formulas and equivalence, decisions about alternatives involving capital recovery, effective economic life, rate of return, replacement analysis, depreciation, and depletion. Other techniques to be covered include the analysis of break even and minimum cost, and decision trees in relation to capital project evaluation. The course has been designed so that knowledge of mathematics at a basic level is required.

567. Introduction to Operational Research. F. K. W. Mak, Ph.D. (London), C.Eng., M.I.Mech.E., F.B.I.M. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room 30, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$150

Operational Research is a most useful technique for all managers and administrators, enabling them to understand and use the more advanced methods of information collection, processing and control which lead to a more efficient organization. Students should have a basic knowledge of algebra but all other mathematical concepts will be explained. The course has been designed to suit those who have no previous knowledge of Operational Research and to act as an

introductory course for those wishing to pursue more advanced studies in this area.

568. An Introduction to Commercial Shipping Practice. Maine Li, B.B.A., (Hawaii), M.B.A. (Texas). Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 19, 1983. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings.

Fee: \$150

Import and export trade is the essence of Hong Kong's economy. Shipping practice is directly or indirectly related to all kinds of import and export trade. This course will cover the basic knowledge concerning shipping practice and management. Topics to be discussed include: the functions of a Bill of Lading;

containerization; different kinds of shipping companies and their functions; general structure and ship types; freight rate structure; chartering and charter-parties; the relationship between ship owners and merchants; shipping documents and procedure; loading and stowage of cargo; the public control of shipping; and marine insurance. Current issues concerning the shipping industry will also be discussed.

569. The Management of Air Freight Operations. Alan Miu, A.M.I.P.M., A.M.I.T.D. Saturdays, 2.00–3.30 p.m., starting February 19, 1983. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The Air Freight Industry has developed in Hong Kong to be one of the vital links in the supply to business enterprises and in the export of the manufactured goods. In this course all aspects of air cargo procedures and movement will be analysed and discussed. Particular reference will be made to the criteria for acceptance of different types of cargo, the calculation of appropriate freight charges, rules pertaining to airway bills, cargo documentation, procedures for claims and liabilities, restricted articles, and the necessary import/export regulations in force in Hong Kong. The course has been designed for those who specialize in Air Cargo forwarding, Shippers and Exporters, and will be illustrated with examples and exercises.

570. International Trade. Lawrence Chan, B.A. (Simon Fraser). Mondays, 7.15-8.45 p.m., starting February 21, 1983. Room 415, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

A comprehensive analysis of the factors affecting international trading arrangements will be offered in this course. These range from the internal requirements of a company in terms of product and marketing organization, the establishment of distribution channels domestically and overseas, identifying foreign markets, to the financial and operational features of exporting. The sources of finance and procedures for importing will also be considered, together with the role of Government in the import/export functions. The course will be of interest to those who are examining the feasibility of opening an import/export business or who have recently entered the field.

571. Managing the Marketing Function. Danny Lam, B. Comm. (Dalhousie), Dip. Bus. Admin. Saturdays, 2.00-3.30 p.m., starting February 19, 1983. Room 28, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

Adoption of the Marketing Concept requires that an organization should examine all of its component activities to ensure that they are geared towards the achievement of objectives in the market place. The elements of the marketing mix will be explained and analysed, notably product planning, pricing policy,

channels of distribution, and promotion and advertising. Market forces will also be reviewed, ranging from buyer behaviour, to trade behaviour, competitive activity, the role of government and the research techniques necessary to define them. This course will be of interest to individuals recently entered or who intend to enter the marketing field and who wish to make a comprehensive assessment of all features of marketing strategy.

572. Marketing Management: Analysis, Planning and Control. Paul Mak, B.Sc. (H.K.), M.B.A. (Sheffield), M.B.I.M. Saturdays, 3.45-5.15 p.m., starting February 19, 1983. Room 28, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

Marketing in the modern sense has evolved from its origins in selling and distribution into a comprehensive philosophy for relating an organization's products to consumer needs. The application of the marketing concept makes it necessary that all elements are properly established in their own right and co-ordinated. This applies particularly to establishing the appropriate organization, research into market needs, channels of distribution, selling, pricing policies and advertising and sales promotion activities. Particular attention will be paid to marketing in the context of Hong Kong. This course is intended for junior executives whether in a specialist marketing area or not, and those engaged in general management who wish to gain a greater insight into the relevance and working of the marketing function in a business operation.

573. Strategic Marketing Planning. Dominic Chan, B.Comm. (Concordia), M.B.A. (Hawaii). Tuesdays, 7.15–8.45 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room 142, University Main Building. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

Given the current climate of competition in the business environment, strategies are required to attain the goals of individual corporations. The success of every corporation relies on the careful formulation and implementation of appropriate marketing strategies. In this course, three major elements of strategic marketing planning will be reviewed: (1) analytical prerequisites for planning which include ways to analyze customers, competitors, environmental trends, marketing characteristics, company capabilities and cost dynamics; (2) formal strategic planning methods which include portfolio analysis, marketing attractiveness, business assessment and the profit impact of marketing strategy (PIMS) programme; and (3) creative and managerial aspects of planning which include ways to define creatively and segment the business, the human side of planning, and ways of implementing planning and preparing a strategic marketing plan. This course has been specially designed for marketing executives and those who wish to pursue a career in this field.

574. An Approach to Effective Advertising. John Tung, B.A. (Western Ontario). Wednesdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 23, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The course has been designed to present a systematic approach to the use of advertising. Amongst the major themes to be examined are: the role of advertising in the marketing mix, market segmentation, target definition, consumer needs and wants, product/brand positioning, advertising objectives and strategy, copy strategy and execution, media planning and market research. Themes and cases will be illustrated with audio-video aids. The course will encourage active participation in assessment and constructive criticism from participants.

575. The Marketing of Tourism. Maine Li, B.B.A. (Hawaii), M.B.A. (Texas). Saturdays, 2.00–3.30 p.m., starting February 19, 1983. Room 20, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

The different facets of Hong Kong's Tourist Industry represent a marketing situation of large and growing proportions. Tourism may be defined as a series of interlinked elements in the marketing mix, covering people, promotions, the distribution of facilities, the product being marketed, and its price. All of these features of the Tourist Industry play their part in the attraction of visitors to Hong Kong. Special emphasis will be placed on the role of the Tourist Association and of techniques of Market Research in making the best use of facilities for developing Tourism. The development of short and long term strategies for the Tourist Industry will also be a major theme. This course has been designed to be of interest to the wide variety of people who are directly or indirectly connected with Tourism in Hong Kong.

576. 管理學與企業組織導論 (An Introduction to Management and Organization)

本課程旨在介紹工商企業組織的管理理論和實踐。內容包括:組織結構、行政人員主要職責、管理訊息系統、工作設計及商務决策方案。本課程亦會研究組織變遷和發展的原理。主要課題包括人力資源計劃、激勵與領導原理、和調和組織內的歧見。

577. 組織理論 (Organization Theory)

丰 謹 人: 黃誠中先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 21 室。

時 間:一九八三年二月二十三日起每星期三下午八時十五分至九時四十五分。

全期學費:一百五十元。 (共十二講)。

組織理論(或稱管理/機構理論)並非是近年才與起的,早在1947年已開始引起學者及管理學者的與趣,但有關的內容多分散於管理學、行政理論、社會學等學科內。純粹以一獨立科系來對待,乃是近年的事。本課程對組織理論的發展及各學派的優點將作一有系統的研討,並對組織結構及工作再設計等作深入的討論。透過此研討課程,會對組織本體有更深入的認識。課程內容編排如下:澄清混淆的理論、科學管理學派、古典管理學派、官僚學派、人際關係學派、社會工業學派、一般系統理論、行動推論架構、多元議學派、隨機組織學派、工業、環境及不同的組織、組織結構的設計:集權及分權、機械式及有機式。

578. 市場學與市場研究 (Marketing and Marketing Research)

主 講 人:吳佩萍碩士。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 30 室。

時 間:一九八三年二月二十一日起每星期一下午六時至七時三十分。

全期學費:一百七十元。 (共十四講)。

市場學乃商業經營的重要一環。故本課程主旨在評論及衡量市場學的功能:包括市場策略;產品計劃;價格决定;銷售技巧;分銷路線及國際市場所產生之問題;並將用較多的時間探討市場研究:內容包括市場研究之範圍,目的及組織,資料搜集及分析,調查表的形式,抽樣原理及消費者行為的分析。

579. 國際市場學 (International Marketing)

主 講 人:張振華先生。

地 點:香港大學鈕魯詩樓 415 室。

時 間:一九八三年二月二十五日起每星期五下午七時四十五分至九時十五分。

全期學費:一百五十元。 (共十二講)。

市場學乃商業經營重要的一環。本課程旨在介紹如何利用管理概念以輔助國際市場的銷售。內容包括國際市場研究、分析,營銷途徑,產品計劃的釐定,海外市場的拓展,價格釐定方法,國際營銷方案等。並以實例介紹及分析國際市場學所 常遇到的問題與解決方法。歡迎對市場學有與趣人仕報名。

By showing the contrast in stress and intonation between English and Chinese (Cantonese and Mandarin) the tutor will help the Chinese student to grasp:

the tonal and rhythmic system of his mother tongue, and how errors in his English speech arise from his native language habits.

Methods of correcting errors will be suggested and graded aural-oral exercises on English Intonation will be provided. Intonation practice will be related to everyday idiomatic English in order to increase the student's range of expression.

This course aims to provide the secondary school teacher with a collection of teaching techniques and ideas about how to approach language learning and the learning situation. Teachers are expected to participate actively.

Syllabus:

Methodology; the shape of a unit; planning for an English lesson; classroom organisation and group work;

Presentation, practice and application; teaching listening skills;

teaching speaking skills (including a Drama Workshop); teaching reading skills;

teaching writing skills; summary and precis writing; integrating language work; teaching advanced learners; motivation; teaching vocabulary; communication games; coping with the coursebook; language across curriculum: the role of ELT in Hong Kong.

623. Games and Activities in English Language Teaching. Mrs B. A. Taylor, B.Soc.Sc. (Birmingham). Fridays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting February 25, 1983. Room 17, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$120

The teaching of English can very easily become rather too formal and academic, with the emphasis placed on reading and writing only. The result is frequently that students have considerable difficulty in speaking the language they have learned. The current trend, however, introducing language teaching games into the teaching of English has had the effect of de-formalising the teaching and making what is learnt more applicable to real life. Students will thus be able to make use of what they have learned, and this will have a positive effect on both their motivation and achievement.

The aim of this course is to devise and practise language teaching games for use in the classroom. Those introduced in the course will be situation-based, and there will be extensive use of micro-dialogue, with the students themselves speaking and responding in natural, spoken English. Consideration will also be given to different ways of playing the games and to the linguistic aims involved.

Participants should be prepared to play an active role in the group and be ready to adapt the games considered to the needs of their own pupils. They may be asked to bring their own materials and to devise and take part in the games.

Enrolment will be limited to 20 persons and may be by selection of those most qualified to benefit from the course of tuition. Preference will be given to those teaching English in Lower Secondary forms.

The course is planned to help the student towards an approach to poetry that will be valuable in subsequent reading. 630. Geotechnical Methods: Recent Developments & their Applications in Modern Building Industry. J. C. W. Lau, M.Sc. (Manc.), Ph.D. (London), C.Eng. M.I.C.E., M.I.Struct.E., M.H.K.I.E., F.G.S. Saturdays, 9.30 a.m.-12.45 p.m., starting March 5, 1983. Room 15, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 6 meetings. Fee: \$200

The following topics will be discussed with the aim of providing practising Civil and Structural Engineers with up-to-date knowledge of recent trends in geotechnical engineering: site investigation techniques; rock mechanics: properties of intact rocks and their measurement, shear strength of jointed rocks; rock slope stability: rock joint survey and graphical presentation on stereonets, methods of slope stability analysis, theory and design of rock anchors; soil mechanics: properties of soils and their measurement; soil slope stability: limit equilibrium methods; infiltration theories: infiltration of rain water into unprotected slopes and its effect on slope stability, physics of unsaturated flow; earth pressures on retaining structures; dewatering: effects on buildings; and modern stress-strain theories and computational methods: tensor notations, constitutive laws, introduction to finite element method, limit analyses, implication of strain-softening in geotechnical engineering.

Entry qualifications: B.Sc. or equivalent in Engineering or related fields.

631. India's Struggle for Independence, 1857-1947. Miss Coonoor Kripalani, B.A. (Delhi). Mondays, 6.10-7.40 p.m., starting March 7, 1983. Room 106, James Hsioung Lee Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 8 meetings. Fee: \$100

This course will cover India's struggle for Independence, starting with the Mutiny of 1857. The impact of the European presence in the early and midnineteenth century will be studied, and traced through to the rise of nationalist sentiment in India. Specifically, the growth of the middle-class, development of the press and vernacular literature, and the founding of the Indian National Congress will be looked at, together with other political parties, such as the Muslim League. The role of Gandhi, Nehru, Jinnah and other prominent leaders of the freedom movement will be discussed, as well as the British response to their demands. Finally, the success of the movement will be studied, with the transfer of power to independent India in August 1947.

632. History of Meiji Japan: the Major Themes. Joseph K. S. Yick, B.A. (Texas), M.A. (California). Wednesdays, 6.10-7.40 p.m., starting March 2, 1983. Room 24, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$120

This course covers the history of Meiji Japan (1868–1912), with particular emphasis on the rise of Japan as the first modern industrial non-Western power and the link between industrialism and expansionism in this period. The approach will be topical as well as chronological, and the contents will include the following: the Ambiguous Legacy of Japanese Feudalism; Crisis in the Tokugawa System; the Meiji Restoration; Cultural Revolution and Confusion in Meiji Japan; Building the Nation-State; Beginnings of Industrialization; Imperialism and the New Industrial Society.

Enrolment is limited to 20.

Fee: \$120

The 1911 Revolution is one of the most controversial topics in modern Chinese

history and it continues to influence the political development of present-day China to a great extent.

The topics to be covered include the personality of Dr. Sun Yat-sen, his contribution to the revolutionary movement as compared with Huang Hsing and other leaders, the Three People's Principles, the revolutionary organizations and their activities, the revolutionary programme of the Tung Meng Hui, the role of secret societies, overseas Chinese and returned students in the movement, the policies of the Western powers towards the revolution, the relationship between the revolutionaries and constitutionalists, the railway protection movement, the manoeuvre of Yuan Shih-kai and finally, an evaluation of the relative success and failure of the 1911 Revolution.

Views of Western and Chinese scholars (both KMT and Marxist) will be introduced to enhance understanding of the revolutionary movement.

本講座詳細介紹有關朗誦方面的基本知識、技巧運用及訓練方法等,使教師及喜愛朗誦者對朗誦能有較系統而全面的認識 , 講授內容包括 : 朗誦的意義及功用;朗誦的情意表達技巧(聲調的控送,節奏的處理,情感的表達,動作的設計);個人朗誦的指導方法:訓練集體朗誦的步驟;集體朗誦的技巧運用;除型的編排;和聲誦讀的處理,二人對話誦讀的方法;造型的朗誦 ; 視讀的訓練法 ; 新詩、散文、詩、詞、曲的朗誦;誦材的編選;及評判朗誦的準則。

本課程着重理論與實際經驗的結合,並有示範及錄音以輔助教師於訓練時有所參攷,(限收三十人)。

705. 翻譯的基本觀念和技巧
(Basic Concepts and Techniques of Translation)

翻譯是一種藝術,也是一種重要的工具學問。然而翻譯不是件簡單的工作,也不如想像中的容易。單就中英文翻譯工作而言,搞翻譯的人應最少需要掌握這兩種文字的使用,而東西方語言的結構,習慣以及詞藻均迴然不同。更增加了翻譯工作的困難。本課程旨在介紹翻譯的基本觀念,也探討各種翻譯的技巧。課程內容包括「信、達、雅」之翻譯原則,意譯與直譯,成語及慣用語之翻譯等。講授時會列舉譯例加以闡釋並作討論。(限收二十五人)。

706. 英譯中技巧研討班

(Seminar in Translation: From English to Chinese)

香港是一個華洋雜處的社會,各界行政人員必須在一定程度上掌握中英兩種 文字的翻譯能力,才能有效地溝通人際關係和準確地傳達訊息。

本課程通過研討和實習,明確翻譯的標準,講授各種翻譯技巧,幫助參與者 具備一個翻譯工作人員所應有的質素,翻譯是一門實踐課,當以習作爲主,通過練 習和講師的講評,結合實例(新聞、商業、聯合國文件、文學、歷史等方面),逐 步提高參與者的翻譯水平。(限收二十五人)。

707. 公事文件翻译 (Documentary Translation)

地 點:香港大學厲樹雄科學館 G1 室。

全期學費:一百六十五分。 (共十五講)。

翻譯在香港已日趨專業化,爲配合各種政府部門及私人的工商業與法律機構 翻譯與行政上的需要,本課程將包括公事文件翻譯的技巧,會議程序及會議紀錄、 議案等的翻譯;商業信札的翻譯;銀行文件的翻譯,一般演說詞的翻譯;啟示、柬 帖、通告,便條及其他報告等的翻譯。(限收二十五人)。

PHILOSOPHY

708. 佛學概論 (Introduction to Buddhism)

時 間:一九八三年二月廿三日起每星期三下午六時十五分至七時四十五分。

全期學費:一百一十五元。 (共十二講)。

佛家思想影響中國及整個亞洲文化至大,故對佛學之源流、派別及哲理,宜 有一明確認識。

本課程將特別講授: (一) 佛教與佛學, (二) 佛法的創始者釋迦牟尼。 (三) 佛家典籍概觀, (四) 佛法的有情觀與世界觀, (五) 因緣業果, (六) 三 法印, (七) 小乘佛學概觀。(八) 大乘佛學概觀, (九) 修行與證果。講授之目 的在使初學者明瞭佛學的一般情況。

709. 佛經選講:金剛般若經 (Selected Buddhist Text)

主 講 人:羅時憲先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 24 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月二日起每星期三下午八時至九時卅分。

全期學費:一百一十五元。 (共十一講)。

大乘佛學有空宗、有宗。本經爲空宗之重要經典,禪宗六祖慧能因聞此經而 悟道,隋唐以來注釋此經者凡八十餘家,文人學士之稱引此經者不計其數,可見其 影響中國人思想之大。本講依印度世親論師的疏釋,比較六種譯本,剖析經文,俾 初學者藉此得覩全經之面貌。(限收二十人)。

710. 西洋哲學與中國 (Western Philosophy and China)

主講 人:鄭烱堅碩士。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 15 室。

時 間:一九八三年二月廿八日起每星期一下午七時至八時十五分。

全期學費:九十元。 (共十二講)。

哲學一向被譽爲「羣學之首」,「全體大用之學」,「科學之科學」。本課程通過哲學,幫助學員探索宇宙觀,人生觀及其他學術問題(如社政、 神學、 文學、美術、音樂等),並提供哲理基礎,使所研究之學術更富於深度和價值,並選若干要點作中西比較。

講述上避免一般人視哲學爲畏途之枯燥艱澀,而務求深入淺出,人人可學。 學理、實用、趣味兼顧。選講範圍:哲學之意義價值 , 神話藝術之哲理 , 中西美 學;中西哲學特質比較,中西哲人論「人」; 泰利士(首位哲人)到蘇格拉底,伯 拉圖,亞里士多德;中古及近代哲人康德,謝林,菲希特,黑格爾,馬克思;叔本 華,尼采,存在主義;理性,經驗,唯物,唯心,實證,功利 , 進化 , 實用主義 等;及中國學人(如王國維,嚴復,蔡元培,胡適,陳獨秀,李大釗等)與西方哲 學,及中西文化交流。

711· 中國哲學 (Chinese Philosophy)

時 間:一九八三年二月廿八日起每星期一下午八時卅分至十時。

全期學費:一百一十五元。 (共十二講)。

中國哲學:精深博大,對社會人生之實效價值,早已引起全球學者所重視。 此課程不但適合哲理思想及義理文學之愛好者,且對一般人之生活修養及智慧啟發 有助。講解深入淺出,寓高深於趣味,初學可懂,選講範圍:問易,孔孟荀,老 莊,墨子,列子,惠施,公孫龍子,韓非子,呂不韋,董仲舒,王充,劉劭,劉 勰,韓愈,柳宗元;周張劭,二程,朱熹,陸九淵,王陽明;王船山,顏習齋,鄭 震,章實齋,康有爲,梁啟超,陳獨秀,李大釗,魯迅,胡邁;及專題:先秦邏輯 批判,中哲天命觀,批孔與儒法之爭,雜家與西方哲學折衷主義,先秦諸子比較, 玄學,滄敎,佛學,陰陽五行,中國無神論,中國各期各派思想與中外文化亦流。

712. 古今陶瓷欣賞

(Appreciation of Chinese Ceramics & Porcelain)

近日各地仿古陶瓷,製作精巧迫肖, 直可亂眞。 本課程著重古今陶瓷之比較,增進辨眞識力。古人製器固屬艱難;今人仿造亦非易事。故古今陶藝皆有其欣賞價值。本課將就製作技術、釉色、土質爲特點作古今陶瓷欣賞之重點講述。

713. 山水國畫的基本寫法 (Chinese Landscape Painting)

全期學費:一百五十元。 (共十五講)。

本課程內容包括:

(一)樹幹、樹枝、和樹木的穿挿法;(二)樹葉的畫法:松葉、柳葉、竹葉、大混點、小混點、介字點、胡椒點;(三)山石的皴法,大間小法,小間大法;(四)山石的組合;(五)點苔法、直點、橫點、介字點、胡椒點;(六)水泉法、畫瀑布法;(七)畫細泉法、畫平泉法;(八)畫烟雲法;(九)畫屋字、亭台、樓閣橋樑法;(十)用筆、用墨、用色法;(十一)寫宣紙法;(十二)寫扇面法;(十三)臨摹;(十四)寫生;(十五)創作、及其他實習。

本課程綜合以上課題,使學員明瞭寫山水基本方法,並善用宣紙,扇面各法。每講必有欣賞,示範,修改作業。

714. 花鳥畫構圖與賦色技巧 (Flowers & Birds Painting)

全期學費:二百二十五元。 (共二十講)。

本課程為有志研習中國花鳥畫技法,與花鳥畫各種構圖及設色技巧者而設。內容包括:(一)春、夏、秋、冬四季花卉構圖與設色;(二)各類禽鳥與四季花卉配合構圖技法;(三)桃花與鴛鴦構圖與設色;(四)荷花與翠鳥構圖與設色;(五)芙蓉與鳥雀構圖與設色;(六)梅花與喜鵲構圖設色;(七)各類花卉、禽鳥取形,寫神,鈎勒、沒骨、點染技巧;(八)介紹欣賞歷代中國名家花鳥畫作品。即席示範並批改習作,(包括畫面署款,題字與用印示範)。每課分發講義附習作樣本。(限收二十五人)。

715. 應用書法各類紙絹寫作技巧 (Practical Calligraphy and Writing Materials)

主 講 人:徐達之先生。講授語言:粤語(輔以國語)。

地 點:香港大學鈕魯詩樓 229 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月十二日起每星期六下午四時二十分至五時五十分。

全期學費:二百二十五元。 (共二十講)。

本課程為適應中文工作者繕寫文稿,函件,抄錄詩文,大字對聯,條幅、招牌,匾額等應用書法而設。內容包括:(一)中文字體的結構與筆法分解;(二)硬筆小字與原子筆、自來水筆之運用;(三)毛筆小楷書法之研習法;(四)毛筆大字楷、行、草、書、研習法;(五)對聯條幅書寫法;(六)招牌、匾額、書法之研習;(七)白宣紙、染色紙與洋紙書寫法;(八)白絹與染色絹書寫法;(九)王羲之王献之小楷書法研習;(十)顏魯公大楷書法研習。每課分發講義及習作樣本。(限收二十五人)。

716. 書法藝術的水墨調配與運筆 (Water & Ink in Chinese Calligraphy)

主 講 人:徐達之先生。講授語言:粵語(輔以國語)。 地 點:香港鰂魚涌太古城聖約翰男女書院 102 室。

時間:一九八三年三月十四日起每星期一下午七時至九時。

全期學費:二百二十五元。 (共十五講)。

中國書法藝術,龍飛鳳舞,千變萬化,但能掌握運筆技巧,又善於調配水墨,則萬變不難其宗。只要熟練某一種字體之後,便能極變化之妙,盡書法藝術之

能事。本課程即以研習水墨調配與運筆。內容包括:(一)書法藝術各體碑刻名帖介紹;(二)各體碑帖應用筆墨紙張之選擇;(三)在唐碑、魏碑或其他碑帖中選定主要研習之版本;(四)唐碑:顏,柳,歐,虞,褚各體碑刻之欣賞;(五)魏碑:石門銘、瘞鶴銘,鄭文公碑刻之欣賞;(六)漢隸八分碑刻之欣賞;(七)各種碑刻名帖用筆之選擇;(八)水墨調配與運筆之研習。每課分發講義並附字範樣本。(限收二十五人)。

717. 現代山水畫意境與水墨彩新技巧

(Impression and Technique in Chinese Landscape Painting)

主 講 人:徐達之先生。 講授語言:粤語(輔以國語)。

地 點:香港鰂魚涌太古城聖約翰男女書院 102 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月十六日起每星期三下午七時至九時。

全期學費:二百二十五元。 (共十五講)。

本課程特為有志研習現代山水畫新意境與水墨彩之新技法者而設。山水畫在中國藝術史上有悠久之歷史,自唐代以來卽注重意境之描繪,唐王維所繪山水,人稱「畫中有詩」,卽說明其山水畫蘊涵着詩情意境。歷經宋、元、明、清各代,山水畫意境旣隨時代而不斷創新,用以表現意境之水墨彩技法,亦日新月異,本課程卽以現代山水畫爲研習對象。內容包括:(一)山水畫之傳統宗派;(二)山水畫之鈎勒皴擦,點染、設色傳統技法;(三)山水畫之現代新意境;(四)山水畫之水墨、設色新技法;(五)山水畫之寫生、寫意、抽象新技法;(六)渲染、潑墨、潑彩技法與畫具之運用;(七)紙、絹之選擇。每課分發講義。(限收二十五人)。

718. 現代國畫魚龍篇 (Fish and Dragon in Chinese Painting)

主 講 人:李撫虹先生。

地 點:香港英皇道 193 號英皇中心 K座二樓巴海教中心。

時 間:一九八三年三月十三日起每星期日下午二時卅分至四時。

全期學費:二百二十五元。 (共二十講)。

本課所提示鱗介中之錦鯉與金魚爲吾人所習見。其華麗動人之處,遠非熱帶 魚類所能比擬。主講人蓄養旣欠,寫生尤勤。由經驗積累旣了解其性格,以作神情 生動之表現,故在技法上,無論工細(鈎勒)簡畧(沒骨)莫不並佳皆妙,栩栩如 生。

至于雲中之龍,雖無跡象可尋,惟想像中,亦有其一致的造型和動態。抑我 國畫裏,亦有彪炳輝皇的史跡,且爲世界藝壇所獨有。而龍之與雲,猶魚之與水, 非使互相交融不能臻于至美。

本課作綜合和分析之研究,對于學者的體會與實踐有相當的効果。(限收二十五人)。

720. 篆刻藝術 (The Art of Seal Engraving)

Each hopeful vision of life, whether in the great religions or in modern utopian schemes, implies a view of human nature and human "Salvation". The meaning of "Salvation" will be examined in Hinduism, Buddhism, Taoism, as well as Marxism, Existentialism, and certain modern psychologies. These will be compared with the Christian "Way".

722. 趣味邏輯淺解 (Introductory Logic)

724. 哲學導論 (Introduction to Philosophy)

古希腊一位哲學家說:「年輕的人,應及早研讀哲學;甚至年長的,也不要放棄唸哲學;因爲固立靈魂的健康,是沒所謂太早或太遲的。」

本課程的目的在於普及哲學,使「哲學」一詞不再披上神秘的色彩。課程分下列三部份: (一)倫理學 (Ethics) —— 探討人生的意義 、 價值觀念等問題。 (二)形上學 (Metaphysics)——研究宇宙眞實體,存有 (Being) 等問題 (三)知識論——反省如知識確立的基礎,我們的知識是否可靠等問題。

725. 引導兒童科學概念的發展

(Development of Scientific Concepts in Young Children)

全期學費:八十元。 (共八講)。

對四至十歲的兒童來說,科學是甚麼,他們怎樣吸收和學習科學概念,都是 教師和家長感到興趣的。本課程是針對上述問題而設,目的是介紹一些基本理論和 方法,給予教師和家長去參考,從而幫助兒童去掌握科學概念。

課程內容包括: (一)何謂科學、何謂概念,兒童對科學的觀念; (二)簡介心理學家和教育學家對兒童學習科學過程的研究成果; (三)以一些科學題材例如空氣,生長等爲例,介紹一些教導方式,令兒童對科學更感興趣;吸收更多; (四)學習科學與其他學科的關係。

念之形成和改變; 群體的結構和成員的行為, 群體力學; 領袖和領導; 偏見之形成; 現代都市生活及稠密之人口對行為之影響等。

曾修讀心理學導論(一)者得優先取錄。

727. 心理學疾病和行為 (Psychological Implications of Illness)

時 間:一九八三年二月廿八日起每星期一下午六時至七時三十分。

全期學費:一百二十元。 (十二講)。

縱使常云「小病是福」,一般來說,生病仍是令人討厭的;生病影响我們的身體,同時也影响我們對自己,對別人,和事物的觀感,我們的行為也或多或少因此而有改變。本課程的目的是幫助學員了解疾病和人的感受並行為的關係。

課程內容包括:心理學與疾病的關係;感覺與訊息傳遞,學習與記憶、性格 與精神緊張,疾病對不同年紀的人的含意;華人對健康和疾病二者的觀念;疾病與 行為;患上不治之症(如癌)及面對死亡;傷殘所引起的心理影响等,歡迎學員提 出實例研討。

日常生活中我們難免遇到各種精神壓力的困擾,並且要花不少精力去應付。 爲使學員能更有效地處理精神壓力的問題,本課程將闡釋常見之精神壓力及所引起 的情緒反應;研討如何去克服例如緊張、焦慮、煩燥、担憂、恐懼等等情緒困擾, 並提出適合個人應用的處理辦法。參加學員務要積極參與。

729. 與青少年子女相處 (Effective Parenthood II)

青少年是一個從童年踏至成年的橋樑,在這一段時期,他們被認為情緒波動 較大,旣反叛,又童心未泯,他們在生理、心理和社交方面轉變得那麼快,以致和 他們相處的成年人未免有點措手不及之感。 本課程的目標是幫助家長更加了解青少年(特別是高小至初中程度)子女的心理發展和特徵,促進積極的父母子女關係,課程內容包括:兒童的成長過程;青少年的成長過程;本港青少年的心態;了解自己;婚姻協調與子女的關係;與青少年人溝通及影响溝通的因素;對於預防問題和補救方法的建議等。歡迎家長及對青少年問題有興趣的人士參加,提出實例研討。

730. 嬰兒的護理 (The First Two Years of Life)

時 間:一九八三年三月十一日起每星期五下午八時至九時三十分。

全期學費:九十元。 (共十講)。

本課程旨在向家長及兒童護理工作者介紹幼兒的一般衞生醫學常識。內容包括兩歲以下兒童的生長、發育、營養和疾病的預防護理等問題。

733. Introduction to Public Administration. Kathleen Cheek-Milby, Ph.D. (Cincinnati). Tuesdays, 8.05-9.35 p.m., starting March 8, 1983. Room 18, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$125

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the conceptual framework needed for an understanding of public administration. Major topics include: definitions, especially the distinction between public and private administration; the evolution of the field of public administration, with emphasis on 20th century developments; concepts used in the analysis of organisation, organisation theory, decision-making theory, and the public policy process.

734. Issues in Public Administration: Public Policy in Hong Kong. Kathleen Cheek-Milby, Ph.D. (Cincinnati). Wednesdays, 8.05–9.35 p.m., starting March 9, 1983. Room 15, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings.

738. Teaching of Physics at Certificate of Education level. P. K. Tao, B.Sc. (C.U.H.K.), M.A. (Leeds), Cert. Ed. (H.K.), Science Subjects Coordinator, Diocesan Boys' School. Fridays, 5.30-7.30 p.m., starting February 25, 1983. Physics Laboratory, Diocesan Boys' School, 131 Argyle Street, Mongkok, Kowloon. 12 meetings. Fee: \$220

Physics teachers will be given an opportunity to familiarise themselves with some of the modern approaches to the teaching of physics at the Certificate of Education (C.E.) level. Special reference will be made to the latest C.E. Physics syllabus. Stress will be laid on the experimental work involved and the teaching strategies of the various topics. The practical problems which may arise in teaching situations will also be discussed. 744. 電腦和電腦化入門 (Computerisation Made Simple)

745. Advanced Information Systems Management. Wanbil W. Lee, B.A., Grad.Dip. Operations Research (Canberra), M.B.A. (New South Wales), A.F.I.M.A., M.A.C.S. Mondays, 7.35-9.35 p.m., starting March 7, 1983. Room 23, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 15 meetings. Fee: \$200

This is a management oriented course in information systems at an advanced level. Focus will be placed on the management of the information system function in today's business organisations and government agencies. It is therefore suitable for experienced managers who desire to update or extend their knowledge of important data processing management issues so as to enhance or upgrade their management skills.

Discussion topics include: policy and effectiveness; project selection and justification; user interface issues; user oriented design practice; systems design project management; lifecycle and methodology; project organisation; project control; management of physical design, program specification and coding tasks; data management issues: DEMS, DB administrator, data analysis; communications network; distributed systems; office automation/MIS/DSS; DP audit; risk management of DP resources.

Enrolment is limited to 30.

746. Computerisation: an Executive's Viewpoint. Y. H. Siu, B.Eng. (McGill). Mondays, 6.00–7.30 p.m., starting March 7, 1983. Room 25, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 12 meetings. Fee: \$150

This course aims at discussing computerisation from the executive's viewpoint. No prior technical knowledge of business data processing is required as basic computer concepts will be dealt with in a depth sufficient for understanding the usage of computers as would be experienced by an executive. Topics to be covered include:

What is a computer system? A brief introduction to computer hardware, software functions and their limitations; case study: the configuration of a typical large computer user in Hong Kong.

Computer applications. The uses of computers in business, including batch, online and realtime applications.

Justification for computerisation. Brief discussion of the common mistakes made in computerisation; the evaluation of costs and benefits.

Computer facilities and services. Bureau services vs in-house computer system, consultancy services and software packages.

The user's role in computerisation.

747. Basic Principles of Computer Systems. P. F. Tse, B.Sc. (H.K.), Computer Officer, University of Hong Kong. Fridays, 7.50-9.30 p.m., starting March 4, 1983. Room 230, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 16 meetings.

Fee: \$200

This course aims to provide an explanation of how computer systems operate. It is designed for people who have no previous knowledge of computers and is specially suitable for people thinking of taking up data processing as a career, as well as those employees whose work involves contact with computer systems. It may be considered as a preliminary to the 'Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming'.

The syllabus will include: the structure of a computer; input; storage; processing; control; output; data representation; binary arithmetic; algorithm; flowcharting; computer programming language; the nature of data processing systems, storage units; input/output units; method of processing.

748. Introduction to Data Processing. C. W. Liu, B.Sc. (H.K.). Tuesdays, 6.30–8.30 p.m., starting March 8, 1983. Room 230, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 10 meetings. Fee: \$190

This course is intended for those whose work involves contact with computer systems and who wish to obtain a fundamental understanding of the principles and methods of electronic data processing. It will be helpful to those who are preparing to take Data Processing in IDP, accounting, business or management examinations. No previous knowledge of computers is necessary but applicants

should have passed English and Mathematics in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination or equivalent. It may be considered as a preliminary to

the 'Certificate Course in Digital Computer Programming'.

The syllabus will include: overview of data processing development; punchedcard data-processing; basic elements of a computer; information representation; data collection and organization; data storage; input/output devices; file updating, sorting and searching; direct access methods and random-processing; concepts of real-time, time-sharing and on-line systems; database management information systems; appreciation of programming languages; the role of the systems analyst and relationships between users and computer people.

Revelant case studies or examples will be introduced.

Computer Workshops on Wednesdays, either (a) 6.00-7.20 p.m., or (b) 7.20-8.40 p.m., or (c) 8.40-10.00 p.m., starting July 27, 1983 (all students will attend the same lectures on Mondays and select one terminal workshop on Wednesdays); Room 218, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 6 lecture meetings and 8 workshop meetings, twice weekly.

Tutor: S. C. Chan, B.Sc. (H.K.)

Fee: \$750 (including computer time).

These courses aim to provide a knowledge of the interactive mode of processing through the study of a popular programming language, BASIC, which is available in most mini-computers. They are particularly aimed at secondary school teachers because of the growing importance of micro-processors in science teaching. No computer knowledge is required, but students should have at least completed secondary school education. Use of the computer is included in the 8 workshop sessions.

The syllabus will include: basic concepts of computer systems; flowcharts; introduction to timesharing and computer programming in BASIC; elementary operations; arithmetic operations; branching and loops; subscripts and arrays;

matrix operations; character strings manipulation; programming with data files; a selection of statistics and business problems.

Every individual working in a laboratory should be aware of the hazards involved and be consciously taking precautions against accidents. Staff in a supervisory capacity such as secondary school teachers or laboratory superintendents have also the responsibility of organising laboratory sessions in such a way that hazards can be minimised. The importance of recognition of the potential hazards, adequate planning in the laboratory, safety management techniques and the education/training of staff and users will be emphasised. When applicable, lectures will be illustrated by laboratory demonstration. Topics to be covered include:

- Recognition of potential hazards. Chemical toxicity; biological hazard; equipment safety; physical safety.
- Planning of laboratory. Layout design; furniture/equipment; electrical safety; fire/explosion protection; ventilation/fume cupboards.

- 759. Operation, Application, Safety and Maintenance of Electronic and Microcomputer-Based Medical Equipment. Thursdays, 6.15-8.15 p.m., starting March 24, 1983. Room G3, fames Lee Science Building, University of Hong Kong. 5 meetings. Fee: \$90
 - Tutors: L. S. Cornish, B.Sc. (Eng.) (Lond.), M.Phil. (H.K.), C.Eng., M.I.E.E., M.B.E.S., Sen.M.I.E.E.E., M.H.K.I.E., Electronics Engineer, Electronic Services Unit, University of Hong Kong.

S. H. Lau, C.E.I. (Lond. Pt. II), A.M.I.E.E., M.I.E.E.E., Assistant Electronics Engineer, University of Hong Kong.

The aims of this course are to help those working in the biomedical laboratory and patient care environments to (i) carry out simple-fault finding and maintenance procedures for biomedical electronic equipment and (ii) identify electrical hazards and prevent their occurrence or minimise their consequences. The principles of operation of electronic instruments will be discussed and the

applications of microcomputers in medical care will be reviewed.

Topics to be discussed will include: brief review of the principles of electricity; electrical supplies to equipment (including mains cables, plugs. sockets and adaptors); components commonly found in an electronic equipment; introduction to the logic world; basic principles of an electronic instrument (e.g. pH meter and pH simulator); maintenance responsibility of users; protective devices including fuses, m.c.b.s, earthing, double insulation; simple fault-finding; demonstration of the use of trouble-shooting equipment; individual responsibility for electrical safety; treatment of electric shock and burns; identification of electrical hazards in the biomedical laboratory and patient care areas; accident prevention; international medical electrical safety standards; study of hazards associated with some specific equipment e.g. electrophoresis, diathermy and dialysis equipment; applications of microcomputers in patient monitoring and data acquisition, diagnosis, therapy, protheses, orthoses and rehabilitation, modelling and simulation, clinical testing and patient, laboratory and hospital management.

760. Hospital and Home Haemodialysis for Patients with Kidney Failure. C. P. Ho, M.B., B.S. (H.K.), M.R.C.P. (U.K.), Senior Medical Officer in Renal Unit, Princess Margaret Hospital, Hong Kong. Fridays, 6.15-7.45 p.m., starting March 4, 1983. Room 230, Knowles Building, University of Hong Kong. 6 meetings. Fee: \$80

Haemodialysis is an effective way to manage patients with end-stage kidney failure. The aim of this course is to introduce the principles and techniques of haemodialysis, including the treatment of water for haemodialysis, various types of artificial kidneys and haemodialysis machines, different types of vascular access and methods of heparinization, problems and emergencies in haemodialysis. Common causes of kidney failure in Hong Kong and drug treatments for patients on maintenance haemodialysis will also be covered.

This course is intended for nurses, dispensers, patients interested in haemodialysis and relatives of chronic renal failure patients. It is a supplement to the practical training in a Dialysis Centre but cannot replace it. Intending students should have a knowledge of biology.

761. Pathology: Its Significance in Medicine and Law. Eugene N. Castagnoli, B.A. (U.C.L.A.), M.D. (Zurich), formerly staff pathologist at the University of Zurich and Basel and member of Scientific Service Department of the Zurich Criminal Police. Tuesdays, 7.00-8.30 p.m., starting March 1, 1983. Lecture Theatre, Old Pathology Building, Queen Mary Hospital Compound. 10 meetings. Fee: \$150

Pathology is that branch of medicine which studies and elucidates the total nature of disease by observing and interpreting pathogenetically-linked functional and structural changes in cells, tissues, organs, and organ systems. No physician would dispute the fact that pathology forms the basis of his perception of medicine and his way of thinking about his patient, nor would any lawyer deny that its use in law provides a solid—often crucial—anchor to reality in many an otherwise dubious legal case.

This course will define the fundamental concepts of pathology, such as inflammation, neoplasia, degeneration, trauma, etc., and explain what the pathologist does and how he does it as evidenced by his work on biopsies, tissue smears, and autopsies. It will also describe the role of pathology in legal medicine where the forensic pathologist is frequently called on to establish the cause of death and the temporally-sequenced chain of events leading to it in individuals whose death is suspected to be of criminal origin. Finally, the course will briefly consider how pathology contributes to a nation's national security.

The lectures will be illustrated with models, slides, and actual specimens whenever possible. A working knowledge of human anatomy and physiology would be an advantage.

762. Introduction to Drug Actions. S. M. Hui, B.Sc. Pharmacy, Ph.D. (Sunderland), M.P.S., M.I.P.M. Mondays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting March 7, 1983. Room 23, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings.

Fee: \$120

The aim is to show how drugs work in the human body to achieve their therapeutic effect. Topics on the safe use of antibiotics, antacids, oral contraceptives, cardiovascular drugs, respiratory drugs, analgesics, anti-inflammatory drugs, sedatives, hypnotics, gastrointestinal drugs and vitamins will be discussed.

This course is intended for dispensers, nurses, sales representatives and technicians employed in the pharmaceutical industry and retail pharmacy. It is preferable that applicants should have a basic knowledge of Biology and Chemistry at least at the Hong Kong Certificate of Education level or its equivalent.

Enrolment is limited to 30.

763. Developing Effective Communication. Peter M. Whyte, Dean of Students, University of Hong Kong. Mondays, 6.15–8.15 p.m., starting February 28, 1983. Room 141, University Main Building. 10 meetings. Fee: \$160

A lecture series with practical exercises aimed at developing understanding of the processes of communication, both verbal and non-verbal, and of methods for maximizing effectiveness of communication. The orientation of the lecturer will be particularly towards communication in the one-to-one counselling situation, the small group situation and the structured interview. Topics will include language, non-verbal communication, person perception, interaction, purposes of communication, content of communication, techniques of communication, and the structured interview.

This course will be particularly useful to those in educational and other counselling or guidance fields and in personnel work.

Enrolment is limited to 24.

469. Introduction to Counselling Approaches. David McCormick, B.Soc.Sc. (U.C.), M.Div., Ph.D. (Southwestern Theological Seminary). Wednesdays, 7.45-9.15 p.m., starting February 23, 1983. Room 16, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 9 meetings.

The course is designed to assist the student recognize and identify several basic approaches to counselling. It will briefly introduce rational-emotive therapy, learning theory approaches, phenomenological approaches, psychoanalytic therapy and existential therapy. Should time allow other therapy concepts will be discussed such as Reality therapy, and Integrity therapy.

This applies to all teachers in Government, aided and private schools. (Closing date for application: February 13, 1983.)

470. Explorations in Counselling. David McCormick, B.Soc.Sc. (U.C.), M.Div., Ph.D. (Southwestern Theological Seminary). Wednesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 23, 1983. Room 16, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 9 meetings. Fee: \$110

This is a foundation course aimed at those who may wish or must by nature of their job do some counselling but are not skilled enough to proceed effectively. The course will be in three parts. The first part deals with the person as counsellor. Topics will include the attributes of a good counsellor, authenticity, and responsibility in varying forms. The second part deals with the counsellee and the goals of counselling in general. The third part deals with the context of counselling. It will examine what happens within the counselling situation and matters such as initiating counselling, creative listening, listening as dialogue, catharisis, and growth.

764. The Structure of Change: a new approach to communication and psychotherapy. George Zee, S.J., M.A., C.A.G.S. (Anna Maria), Diploma from the Gestalt Training Centre in San Diego, Certified Practitioner in the Art of Neuro-Linguistic Programming (NLP). Saturdays, 2.30–5.30 p.m., starting February 26, 1983. Audio-visual Room, Wah Yan College, 56 Waterloo Road. 5 meetings.

Fee: \$130

This course will introduce some of the innovative techniques of Neuro-Linguistic Programming, which deal mainly with the structure of subjective experience. Fundamental skills and rapid and reliable ways of building rapport, gathering information, designing interventions and bringing about positive changes will be covered. The well-renowned Gestalt therapist, John O. Stevens, thinks that "NLP represents a huge quantum jump in our understanding of human behaviour and communication. It makes most current therapy and education obsolete."

Enrolment is restricted to psychologists, social workers and those in the helping professions.

765. Human Sexuality. Miss Veronica Pearson, M.Sc. (Bristol), C.Q.S.W., Lecturer in Social Work, University of Hong Kong. Tuesdays, 6.00-7.30 p.m., starting February 22, 1983. Room 21, Extra-Mural Town Centre, Wing On Centre, 8/F. 10 meetings. Fee: \$120

An attempt will be made to clear up some popular myths and misconceptions about human sexuality, and to enhance sensitivity towards problems individuals and couples have in these areas.

Topics covered will include cultural and personal attitudes towards sex and the role they play in human behaviour; sex based differences in behaviour; the physiology of sexual reactions; sex and the adolescent; contraceptives; sexual dysfunctions in both sexes (such as frigidity, impotence, etc.) and their treatment; homosexuality; and the more common sexual deviations (such as rape, paedo-

philia, etc).

The course is designed with social workers, teachers, counsellors, nurses and other helping professionals in mind, but the interested public is also welcome. Where appropriate, video and film materials, and small group discussion will he used.

766. 社會工作人員與有關家庭法例 (Family Law & the Social Worker)

本課程專爲社會工作人員而設,旨在闡述香港有關家庭的法例,如婚姻法, 離婚法、和收養兒女法等;並討論分居及離婚所引起的財產問題,子女問題,和其 **他經濟問題等。**

本課程並介紹香港現存的各種法律授助及諮詢計劃,及社會工作者如何能充 份利用此等資源以協助其工作對象。歡迎學員提出在工作上所遇到有關這方面的問 題以作討論。

767. 輔導實驗訓練:現象學派方法的基本課程

(Counselling Practicum: A Basic Course in the Phenomenological Approach)

講者們相信透過有系統之輔導實驗訓練,在職之社會工作者更能掌握輔導過 程之精粹。本課程並不着重直接講授,而是以實驗訓練形式進行。强調學員從親身 參與體驗輔導,與受導過程中學習,主要過程會用影音記錄,然後進行分析討論, 再加上講者之綜合囘轍, 協助學員掌握現象學派輔導之基本原則及方法, 內容包 括:(1)現象學派之哲學基礎。(2)現象學派輔導之基本方法,例如:聆聽及 反映技巧, 焦點選擇, 線索辨別, 總結法、提升法、反映分析法, 如何協助當事人

宣洩情緒,化解衝突,及達至悟悉,與及如何處理當事人之抗拒、靜默、試探及其他反面情緒。(3)輔導歷程之分析。(4)輔導員本身的修練。

為使學員了解講者對彼等之期望,及彼此該承約的程度,首十六名報名而符合要求之學員將被邀於二月十七日(星期四)下午七時正出席一個約一小時的聚會,地點在校外課程部市區中心 16 室。學員可屆時才决定是否進修此課程。

本課程的設立旨在探索親職教育的理論基礎及工作方法。課程範圍規限於以 小組形式推行的親職教育,而不包括治療性 (clinically oriented) 的家長小組工作。

此課程專爲在職社會工作者而設,授課形式以研習(workshop)爲主,側重 技巧訓練的學習活動。

769. 青年工作者與家庭生活教育 (Youth Workers and Family Life Education)

時 間:一九八三年二月廿六日起每星期六上午九時三十分至正午十二時。

全期學費:一百四十元。 (共八講)。

家庭生活教育乃香港青少年與家庭服務重點工作之一,目的在培養和諧的人際關係,改善家庭生活質素,防止家庭破裂。對象廣泛而以青少年爲主,由於青年階段是生理、心理、精神及智力快速增長時期;是喜歡嘗試,冒險時期;是充滿理想,幻想時期;更是心緒凌亂, 尋找自我時期, 需要成人輔助以準備進入成年生活。

本課程特別以家庭生活教育範圍內有關青年部份為中心,著重討論青年在身心成長,自我觀念,家人相處,友伴、性觀念、異性交往、前途、戀愛,婚姻等所引起之問題。

家庭生活教育之推行着重知識、態度、技巧三方面運用。本課程目的協助為 青年工作之人士如青年中心工作者,教師等了解推行家庭生活教育之特色;各專題 均採用小組活動、討論、角色扮演等技巧,啟發參加者之實際感受,分享彼此之經 驗及着重個人參予及主動策劃,以收理論實踐之效,使學員日後能適當地應用於實 際工作中。(限收二十四人)。

770. 兒童遊戲作為治療用途之運用 (Child's Play: a therapeutic tool)

地 點:香港大學校本部 237 室。

時 間:一九八三年二月廿八日起每星期一下午六時三十分至八時正。

全期學費:一百六十元。 (共十二滿)。

大多數人心目中,兒童遊戲只不過是消磨時間之活動;只可以帶來一些歡樂的時光,但在心理學家來說,遊戲對於兒童的發展有深遠之影響。本課程著重介紹不同心理門派對兒童遊戲的觀點,解釋遊戲對每個兒童的情緒、性格及智態發展所佔之重要地位,而從這些理論,心理學家提出一連串實際的原則和技巧,利用不同種類的遊戲方式,包括單獨和團體。用不同的玩具和質物,去協助兒童達到最理想之心理發展,或矯正一些有問題之心態及行為。

本課程將會介紹之心理學說甚廣,其中包括主要心理學派,如 psychoanalysis, cognitive psychology, humanistic psychology, behaviourism 或一些頗爲獨特之學說,如 play therapy.

地 點:香港大學許愛周科學館LG1室。

時 間:一九八三年三月二十三日起每星期三下午六時三十分至八時三十分。

全期學費:一百二十元。 (共六講)。

虐待兒童問題現今已深受很多國家及社會的關注,在香港,不少專業人仕亦 已開始對此問題作出研究。而幼兒工作者在防止虐待兒童方面所担當的職位尤其重 要,透過他們日常工作上的接觸,能預早發現被虛兒童及了解其家庭狀況,協助解 決他們的問題。

本課程特爲幼兒工作者而設。主要介紹一些虐兒基本概念及理論,其成因及 影響,並會探討本港虐兒情況,指導如何發掘虐兒個案,解釋被虐兒童的特徵及處 理方法等。課程將着重實際行動方面,以幼兒工作者在整個探索及應付處兒事件過程中所扮演的角色為中心。

本課程特爲兒童護理工作者,幼稚園及小學教師而設,旨在介紹分析兒童行爲之基本理論架構,及對各種輔助兒童方法作一綜合導論。內容包括「遊戲治療」及遊戲的運用,對兒童的心理輔導,繪畫及故事的運用,行爲更易法簡介,兒童問題之預防方法及家長訓練。課程除短講外並包括小組討論及角色扮演等。(限收四十人)。

兒童院家長長久以來是社會工作從業員中工作壓力比較重的一群——長時間 地面對來自不同問題家庭的孩子。旣要是親人、又是教師,也是朋友,很易就會產 生失落、徬徨、孤單,直接間接地將服務質素拉下來。

本課程之目標旨在爲兒童院家長提供精簡的有關工作訓練,務使學員能更深

入地了解自己工作的意義及影響,特別容易產生壓力的地方及社會工作者與住院工作人員彼此間所應互有之關係。

本課程有異於慣常之講授,而較注重於日常工作之實踐,因爲住院工作者很多時是提供服務的第一線,面對不斷的工作挑戰,純理論之提供不能解决問題,反之然應提供的是社會工作化了的實際生活經驗及注意角度,使住院服務同工亦能從社工的角度去看自己的工作。爲求達致共修之裨益,参加者需儘量提供本身之經歷及問題,藉着學員與導師間之雙方面交流而找出可行的辦法,從使達致生活化了的計會工作實踐。

本課程特別爲兒童住院服務工作者而設,經驗年資不拘,不同的經驗更能刺激良佳的討論。而有興趣從事兒童住院服務者亦歡迎參加,藉此而對此行業有一較佳之認識。(限收二十人)。

774. 綜合性青年工作 (Integrated Approaches to Working with Youth)

主 講 人:袁焕森先生。

地 點:香港大學校外課程部市區中心 14 室。

時 間:一九八三年三月四日起每星期五下午七時四十五分至九時四十五分。

全期學費:二百四十元。 (共十二講)。

社會工作的發展從個案工作開始,繼而小組工作,社區工作。近十年來,則 朝綜合性方面發展,究其原委,一則是人被視為完整個體,不能分割其生理、心 理、感情及社會各方面;二則承認人乃生活於現實環境之中,不能單看個人或單看 其環境因素而忽視二者之關連;三則認為社會工作方法之運用應以案主需要而定, 不應以工作之技術專長而定;四則與社會工作專業之認同及知識運用之廣泛性有 關。

本課程著重介紹及比較近十年間發展的各種綜合性工作模式,及其於青年工作範疇之運用:怎樣以綜合概念分析個人或小組之需要及問題?怎樣以綜合概念分析及擬定介入策畧及原則?怎樣結合及聯用個案,小組及社區工作方法以協助青少年的成長?

課程之主要對象爲在職之青年工作者,受訓或未受訓者皆可。上課方法包括 理論講授及個案討論。

775. 適用於青少年工作之人際關係練習及輔導技巧 (Youth Work Counselling Techniques)

主 講 人:會慶寧先生。

時 間:一九八三年三月十二日起每星期六下午二時至五時三十分。

全期學費:二百二十元。 (共八講)。

隨着社會的急劇轉變,墨守成規及被動性的青少年工作程序及訓練方式,已 不再適用於八零年代的青少年工作;而經過嘗試而證明有顯著成效的人際關係訓練 及輔導訓練,已被採用於青少年領袖訓練、小組工作、小組輔導工作以至教學工作 中,以協助青少年的全面發展及成長。

本課程是特別爲具有興趣於青少年工作之在學、在職以至教學工作者而設, 目的是幫助學員認識及活用人際關係練習及輔導技巧。希望於課程完畢後,學員能 對其工作環境及對象有進一步了解,進而能獨立思考,設計適合其工作環境及對象 的練習;並幫助青少年認識及發揮其內在潛能。

777. 在學校中如何應用小組理論和工作技巧 (Application of Small Group Theories and Techniques)

全期學費:一百二十元。 (共十講)。

集體活動及與趣小組是靑少年在學校生活中主要的一部份,本課程旨在介紹 團體生活中小組運行的知識、個人與小組的相互關係,學校教師和輔導人員如何運 用小組的技巧積極地協助學生彼此的人際關係和進行小組輔導工作。

本課程分別介紹小組的基本理論,包括小組與個人的關係;小組歷程與領袖訓練;小組溝通;小組活動的程序和技巧;小組輔導的技巧;以及學校小組的種類和性質。

课程除講授外,並加設小組形式的練習,角式扮演,幻燈片或電影介紹等。 適合在職教師,課外活動導師,學校輔導人員,學校社工人員,青少年工作者及小 組領袖。(限收三十五人)。


